FROM THE PASTOR




Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

This year for the Advent Sermon Series, I am again using a theme and suggested texts for sermons from A Sanctified Art. The theme is entitled "What Can't Wait."

Advent is a season of waiting, but is idle waiting what God

wants of us? In preparation for the coming Messiah, we wonder together—what things can't wait? What demands our immediate attention? What requires our work and preparation? What is it that God can't wait for? Is it our praise, reconciliation, and proclamation? Is it the end of suffering, isolation, and fear? This Advent, we invite you to join us in imag-



ining, prioritizing and preparing. As we wait, what can't?

Lisle Gwynn Garrity is an artist who developed a short film to accompany the series. She writes the following about the film's development.

"I was meditating on the precarious timing of Christ's birth. God chooses an unwed, lower-class teenage girl forced to travel cross-country to be counted for the census in the midst of her third trimester. Matthew's gospel tells us that Christ's birth incites king Herod to mandate a mass infanticide, which forces Mary, Joseph and Jesus to flee to Egypt for refuge. God's plan to enter the world in human flesh seems so perilous—so much could and did go wrong. This led me to wonder, what if God had waited? What if God had waited for some perfect day when all the world's problems were resolved? What if God had waited for a moment—or for a human vessel—that might guarantee success?

"But God couldn't wait. God dove into the mess and the muck of this world so that we might know love. In the same way, we can't sit and wait around for our world's problems to solve themselves. We can't assume that a perfect moment or a fail-proof plan will emerge if we just hold out for long enough. We can't wait to join God in being love known in flesh and bone."




Brothers and Sisters,



COME, ALL YE FAITHFUL

John Francis Wade, author of this hymn, was hounded out of England in 1745. He was a Roman Catholic layman, but because of persecution he fled to France where communities of English-speaking Catholics gathered.

But how could he, a refugee, support himself? In those days the printing of musical scores was cumbersome, and copying them by hand was an art. In the famous Roman Catholic College and Ministry Center in Douay, France, Wade taught music and became renowned as a copyist of musical scores. His work was exquisite.

In 1743, when Wade was 32, he had produced a copy of a Latin Christmas carol beginning with the phrase "Adeste Fidelis, Laeti triumphantes." Initially historians thought Wade had simply discovered an ancient hymn by an unknown author, but most scholars now believe he composed the lyrics.

Wade died in 1786 at the age of 75. His obituary honored him for his "beautiful manuscripts" that adorned chapels and homes.

As time passed, English Catholics began to return to Britain and brought Wade's Christmas carol with them. More time passed, and an Anglican minister named Rev. Frederick Oakeley was deeply moved by Wade's Latin Christmas carol and translated it into English. The first line said: "Ye Faithful, Approach Ye."

Somehow, "Ye Faithful, Approach Ye," didn't catch on. Oakeley became a Roman Catholic priest, and perhaps his grasp of Latin improved, because he finally came up with the simpler, more vigorous, "O Come, All Ye Faithful, Joyful and Triumphant!"

So two brave Englishmen, Catholics, lovers of Christmas and lovers of hymns, living a hundred years apart, writing in two different nations, combined their talents to bid us come, joyful and triumphant, and adore Him, born the King of angels.

FINANCE & STEWARDSHIP



The offerings along with monies received for the use of facilities and the total expenses for the one month of October and year-to-date are as follows:

Excess (deficit)	\$ (22,423.00)	\$ 29,292.00

Monthly Receipts and Expenses fluctuate, which has resulted in 2024 year-to-date excess revenues over expenses of \$29,292. January, February and March revenues reflect numerous IRA contributions which is consistent with the prior year; the result is a large excess which is be used throughout the year. The Finance Committee would like to thank everyone for financially supporting our church.

STEWARDSHIP 2025



I was musing on the words "faithful" and "thankful" today, thinking about how they flow from and into each other and what their connection says to us in this stewardship season.

Because God is faithful, we are thankful. In Exodus 34:6, God describes himself as "abounding in steadfast love and faithfulness." God demonstrates his faithfulness through the gift of His Son, Jesus. Additionally, God promises to take care of all our needs, and gives us other wonderful gifts such as family and friends, purpose and pleasures. God's faithfulness to us is the foundation for us to express our thankfulness to Him.

When we are thankful, we are faithful. In our worship and our prayers, we express our gratitude to God for all God has done for us. "I so enjoy the Christmas season, Ezekiel! I am making a list of all I want to get done. Will you help me collect grass seeds for my

famous Grass Seeds Delight cookies. They are better when they have time to ripen."

"Of course, we can do it today. What I enjoy about the season is the singing of all the familiar hymns in church. That is what puts me in the Christmas spirit."

"You do realize that all the old favorites used to be new hymns when first sung. People seem resistant to new hymns, which can prevent them from becoming 'old favorites'."

"You're right, Mary. That reminds me of how our favorite Christmas hymn came to be."

"It was in 1816 when Josef Mohr, an Austrian Catholic priest, wrote a poem about peace after the end of the Napoleonic wars. It featured the financial insecurity, fires, floods and famine left in its wake. The poem was set aside."

"In 1818 the Salzbach River flooded Mohr's church, St. Nicholas. He asked an organist friend to put his poem to music for two voices and a guitar. Since guitars were not approved by the Catholic Church, the song was sung after the Christmas Eve service."

"It was supposed to be sung just for that night, but an organ repairman heard the song and took it to Tyrol, an area noted for its choirs. It then spread across Europe, then to America."

"Thus was born the beloved hymn, 'Silent Night'."

"Do you think there are any new hymns that will become old favorites?"

"There is one that I hope will. It is hymn number 110 in our new hymnal, "Love Has Come." The words were written in 1996, and the music added in 2012 is a known French carol. Many new hymns are set to familiar tunes."

"I hope we get to sing it this Christmas season, Ezekiel, I am eager to hear it."




HEARTS FOR SUMMERVILLE OPPORTUNITIES




